WRCOG secured grant funds to help Georgetown Stormwater Dept. build wetland in Murrells Inlet



The Georgetown County Stormwater Division recently participated in a project to create a constructed wetland in Murrells Inlet. The project was part of a grant written by Waccamaw Regional Council of Governments. The effort also involved Murrells Inlet 2020 and

Horry County. The project will help remove fecal coliform bacteria from the water before it enters the inlet. Sediment laden runoff transports bacteria that contributes to shellfish bed closures. This type of installation helps improve water quality and prevent those closures. The wetland is located adjacent to Business 17, at the south end of Murrells Inlet.

Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update

On November 3, 2017, the Grand Strand Area Transportation Study (GSATS) Policy Committee approved the 2040 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update. The MTP functions as the long-range planning document for the GSATS Study Area and is updated once every five years per federal requirements. This is the first iteration of the MTP which includes projects from the North Carolina portion of the GSATS Study Area. The 2040 MTP has four primary focus areas: Roadway Improvements, Biking and Walking, Public Transportation, and Regional Mobility.

Local input was an integral component of the 2040 MTP update process. Staff hosted two rounds of public meetings in November 2016 and July 2017 at four meeting locations. In addition to the public meetings, an online “Wikimap” tool used which allowed users to identify locations of traffic problems and comment on proposed transportation improvement recommendations. In total there were 283 public comments submitted throughout the planning process.

A major focus of the GSATS Study Team was to help identify and prioritize long-term projects. There were three main project categories; new construction, widening/interchange, and access management/streetscape/complete streets. A total of 94 South Carolina projects, with an estimated cost of \$1.2 billion, were listed in the document. In North Carolina, 24 projects with an estimated cost of \$520 million were included in the 2040 MTP.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Round

The South Carolina Department of Commerce recently announced its Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding round. CDBG funds are available on a competitive basis to non-entitlement jurisdictions for community enrichment, neighborhood revitalization, and special projects. Available funds are designed to primarily benefit low to moderate income individuals.

Application requests are due to the South Carolina Department of Commerce no later than August 17, 2018. Complete applications are due on September 17, 2018. The Waccamaw Regional Council of Governments’ staff assists jurisdictions in the identification of eligible projects, the preparation of grant applications, and the administration of funded projects. Medicare Open Enrollment 2017 was a huge success! The annual Open Enrollment period is a great time to review existing coverage and to look into making a change based on current plans, budget and personal health needs.

Beulah Torbit, WRCOG's Medicare Specialist, served 350 clients this year compared to 270 during the open enrollment period of 2016.

WRCOG strived to inform all of Williamsburg, Horry, and Georgetown Counties' senior citizens the importance of reviewing the Annual Notice of Change (ANOC) and scheduling a Medicare Part D checkup. To start off Medicare Open Enrollment, Beulah created an outreach titled "Be on the Lookout."

Clients have many health needs and challenges, which require yearly reviews. A number of clients made changes resulting in better coverage and savings. As a result of Medicare Part D review, our highest savings for a client for 2018 was \$5,823.68.
